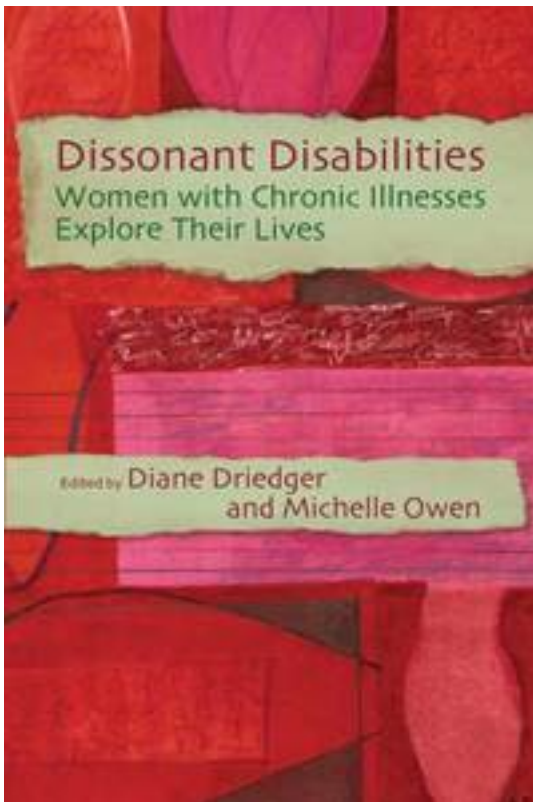


Dissonant Disabilities
